



- The purpose of safety is simple—to provide employees and visitors with a safe and healthy
  work environment to accomplish our goals. The Electronic Systems Center is implementing
  Occupational Safety and Health Administration's (OSHA) Voluntary Protection Program (VPP),
  and we, as 554 ELSW team members, will do our part to ensure the program's success.
- 2. Our focus for the 554 ELSW and all geographically separated units (GSUs) is the four tenets of VPP: Management, Leadership & Employee Involvement; Worksite Analysis; Hazard Prevention & Control; and Safety & Health Training. Leadership at every level must empower employees to take actions necessary to eliminate or mitigate hazards in the workplace. The success of our diverse missions and the safety of our dedicated employees depend on it.
- 3. Communication is essential! Everyone must be cognizant of what they are doing, the type of environment in which they are operating, and the possible consequences of their actions to maintain a culture of safety awareness. Each manager and supervisor is responsible for ensuring that critical safety issues are communicated up, down and across the organization. These issues include training initiatives, identified hazards and deficiencies, and adverse environmental conditions. Moreover, I want to highly encourage you to report potential hazards to your supervisor and/or safety representative.
- 4. I do not believe that mishaps "just happen." So, I challenge each manager, supervisor and employee throughout the 554 ELSW to actively take actions necessary to prevent the costly waste of material, time and human resources that result from mishaps.
- Talk to your organization's VPP/safety representative to get more information on VPP and other safety initiatives, "554...Wired for War!"
